Principals Report



Kia ora koutou, Talofa lava, Greetings everyone

Covid-19 has had a significant effect on teaching and learning and on education in general. I sometimes hear people wish for "things to return to normal". In my opinion this is no longer possible even though the Covid traffic light system ended this year. Instead, we have the 'new normal' to navigate and embrace. With change comes opportunity and the new normal is reflected in how our teachers have adapted to meet the learning needs of our students.

My sincere thanks goes to our teachers and staff who have shown amazing professionalism and flexibility as they continue to respond to the learning needs of our students. A concerning outcome of the Covid-19 pandemic has been a much reduced student attendance rate. Our staff have worked tirelessly to support the learning needs of our students, be they at college or at home. This has been achieved through inventive creativity by our staff. The commitment and passion of our staff constantly impresses me and I

appreciate their work immensely.

For Term 2 this year I was on sabbatical and Sharon Moerkerk was Acting Principal during this time. My sincere thanks goes to Whaea Sharon for the wonderful person she is and the way she professionally and capably led our college during this term.

My focus during sabbatical was related to the de-streaming process we have been through over the last few years. As a college we have found ourselves nationally on the forefront of this growing change in education. The experience gained by our teachers as they engage with teaching in a de-streamed environment is being used to support and guide other schools as they also embrace de-streaming.

A number of staff left during or at the end of 2022. Anisha Jovin taught Chemistry for two terms; Sam Wiblin taught English and Drama for two years; Nicole Hamilton taught English and Food Technology for two years; Jessica Foster taught Science for 4 years; Bethany Nicholas taught Mathematics for 6 years; Jason White was our Deputy Principal for 5 years. We celebrated with Jason as he took up the position of Principal of the Central Regional Health School at the start of Term 2. In his place we welcomed Gilbert Hokianga into the Deputy Principal role and we very quickly saw Gilbert successfully establish himself in our college.

Our Campus Manager, Jono Johnson, with the support of Isaiah Eager have completed an amazing amount of property work this year. As well as meeting the demands of cyclical maintenance, they have initiated a number of building projects including the development of a Horticulture Area. This fenced off area, with hot house, vegetable plots and other infrastructure will facilitate the growth of our Horticulture programmes in the years ahead. A fence has also been constructed around the entire campus. This is a Ministry of Education funded project. My thanks goes to Jono for the successful negotiation he undertook to enable a fence to be built at the front of our college that respects the historical significance of our main block.

Being culturally responsive towards our students and reflecting this in the way we teach continues to be a focus for our staff. Throughout this year we engaged with an outside agency who interviewed our students about the level of cultural responsiveness they experience at our college. This ongoing process will guide the professional development programme for our staff over the medium term as we respond to what our students have shared in these interviews. With the help of Muaūpoko, as PD providers, we intend to improve our culturally responsive practice for the benefit of our students.

Sports continues to be a highlight for many of our students while at college and this year we celebrated many significant achievements. This included our 1st XI Boys Hockey team who won the Founders Cup Trophy during winter tournament week. This is the first time we have won this trophy and congratulations goes to their coach, Dylan Kiriona. Our 1st XI Boys Football team won Division 1 and we were very pleased to field two Girls Football teams this season. The Annuals against Waiopehu College were again highly contested with 10 games played over the week. The final game score was 5-5, which shows how competitive this competition continues to be.

Our Pasifika group - Lototaha, continues to grow in number and experience. At the regional Poly Fusion competition we received 2nd place in cultural performance. This was an amazing result and represented a huge investment of time and commitment from our students. A number of students also gained placings in




other categories. Congratulations goes to our Dean of Pasifika students - Jessica Foster.

My thanks goes to our Board of Trustees who continue to provide excellent governance for our college. This has been recognised by our community who voted at the triennial elections this year to largely keep the same Board. 

There are lots of opportunities for whanaungatanga and getting to know one another. We start each day together in the whare with karakia. We have hui throughout the week including Tikanga Tuesday and Kaitahi Thursday. For Tikanga Tuesday we come to the whare during second break and we learn waiata, haka, our pepeha and different activities where we bond together and learn more about each other. For Kaitahi Thursday we come to the whare during first break with a koha, whether that be food or money, and eat together and catch up about our week, how we're going and upcoming events.

We also have Wānanga Wednesday where we go to different primary schools each year and teach the tuakana of those schools the many things we've learnt, such as the process of pōwhiri. With this they learn many waiata, haka, karanga, whaikorero and learn about the kawa of Muaupoko-tanga.

Hangi is a specialty of our whānau and we do a lot of these throughout the year to raise money for our trips. It is also to teach us how to make a traditional hangi and the tikanga around it all. We lay down a traditional hangi and while we wait for the kai to cook we do whanaungatanga activities around the hangi pit.

Being a part of Rangatahi Ora has enhanced my group working skills and has given me a better overall understanding of my Māori whakapapa and tikanga. TE REO MĀORI

E ngā matā waka, ngā hau e whā

Nei rā te mihi atu ki a koutou katoa.

2022 has been another challenging year for our students, staff and wider whānau. There were a number of events cancelled due to Covid restrictions such as waka ama, and with periods of isolation at home, school attendance fluctuated causing disruption to many of our activities.

With the enthusiasm of Rangatahi Ora, a programme for Māori students striving for success as Māori at Horowhenua College, there continues to be a large number of rangatahi pursuing Te Reo Māori, including studying at NCEA levels. This year we were excited by the growth in interest so Te Kāhui Baker (Matua TK) took on some classes as well which has been awesome for the development of Te Reo at our kura.

We were thrilled to have two kaikorero speak at Nga Manu Korero Secondary School Speech Competitions held at Queen Elizabeth College in June. Alyssa Smaling and Rihara Norgrove-Rangihuna represented themselves, their whānau and our kura with pride at the Manawatū/ Horowhenua Regionals. Alyssa returned as a kaikōrero in the Korimako Senior English section gaining a 3rd placing for her prepared speech and 2nd for her impromptu. She placed 3rd overall. She is a memorable and heartfelt speaker who always carries herself with dignity. Rihara, speaking for the first time entered the Pei Te Hurinui Jones Senior Māori section coming 4th for his prepared speech and 3rd for his impromptu speech. Such an awesome achievement given that both speeches were in Te Reo Māori. Kātahi rā te painga o tēnā! We look forward to increasing our number of speakers in the future.

Te Wiki o te Reo Māori (Māori Language Week) was a special week this year commemorating the 50th anniversary of the presentation of the Māori Language petition to Parliament. As a result, Te Reo Māori has

been taught in schools throughout Aotearoa New Zealand and the language is celebrated annually with a number of special events.

We hosted our Whanaungatanga Day with Waiopehu and Manawatu Colleges which was an opportunity to encourage the use of Te Reo and to participate in traditional Māori sports. This year we played Ariki, a mau rākau activity (Māori weaponry) where points are gained from striking opponents below their knees to eliminate them and their Ariki.

Among the other activities was a staff development session sharing phrases in Te Reo, learning how to weave a tīpare (headband) and playing tītītorea (stick games). We also laid down a hāngi which is always a rewarding experience for our students who learn through their participation at each stage of the process. From

preparing the kai for the individual hāngi trays to digging the hole and stacking the wood and volcanic rocks to lighting the fire at 4am, clearing the ash from the hole and covering the kai to be cooked. Kātahi rā te wiki ko tēnā, wekeneru! (Such an awesome week!). These activities could not have been possible without the support and encouragement from so many. Ehara

Social Science

In 2022 students have been well served by the following staff: Mr Tate, Ms Grey, Mr Bar Shalom, Matua Chris, Miss Davis, Matua Dylan, Mr McElwee, Matua Te Kahui and Miss Wiblin.

Online learning via Google Classroom continues to be an important focus in the teaching and learning in the Social Science Faculty. The key to the success of this is students not only having access to their own device but also engaging with their Google Classrooms if they are absent from class. This was very important when once again we experienced 'lock-down' in Term 1.

Year 9 students had the opportunity throughout the year to select how they preferred to complete some of the work set in each unit. Some students preferred to complete the tasks on an assigned Google Doc while others preferred to use a hard-copy booklet. This is an important aspect of the college wide focus in Universal Design for Learning (UDL) where students select the mode of presentation they are more comfortable with.

Year 10 Social Studies students in Term 3 and Term 4 were involved in trialling a new unit called 'Our Past Our Future'. This has been developed in line with the requirements of the new Aotearoa-New Zealand Histories' curriculum that will be compulsory for all schools in 2023.

Level 1 Social History students took social action in the 2022 Amnesty International Freedom Challenge. This year the issue was the Raise the Age Campaign. The focus was to ask the New Zealand Government to raise the criminal age of responsibility to at least 14. Students raised awareness of the issue with the signing of petitions and writing letters to the Minister of Justice.

The focus for both the Level 2 and Level 3 History students' research this year was on an 'historical







event or place that is of significance'. In keeping in line with the Social Science Faculty commitment to UDL students had the freedom to choose their own topics that reflected personal interest eg: Parihaka, New Zealand Women's Suffrage, Dawn Raids, and the closure of the Kimberley Centre.

Level 2 Sociology students focused their social action this year on 'Poverty' which is a current social issue that impacts on the rights of many people in New Zealand society. The students selected 3 local organisations to help: Hope Kete, Skills4Living and the Food Bank. Over \$1100 was raised for our local community.

The focus for Social Action in Level 3 Sociology is 'influencing a Policy'. Students selected a policy that they were interested in and took actions that included parliamentary petitions and direct lobbying of government ministers. Among the polices selected were, Tightening up on access to Vape products, Universal Student Allowance that applies to all students and harsher punishments for family violence

Level 2 and Level 3 Tourism students worked on a variety of unit standards throughout the year including: Demonstrate Knowledge of World Tourist Destinations, Demonstrate Knowledge of the Business of Tourism and Describe and Promote a New Zealand Tourist Destination.

To all the students sitting external achievement standards: we wish you success To the Year 13 students who are leaving at the end of the year: we wish you well for the future and trust that the skills that you have gained from the Social Science subjects, will help you in your future study and employment opportunities. To those of you (both staff and students) who will be returning in 2023: have a safe and relaxing break and we look forward to seeing you all in February back here at Nua.

A keen entrepreneurial group also led 'Frostea Boba' an at home bubble tea kit which aimed to reduce the plastic waste of single use bubble tea bought from local retailers.





The Level 2 businesses held a Market Showcase at the start of Term 3 to show off their work to the school community. The data the students collected will be used by Waikato University to help build their understanding of the changes occurring at the estuary and what can be done to preserve this precious wildlife reserve.

Our Year 11 students studied micro-organisms and are now proficient at growing bacteria in a laboratory and testing them against disinfectants and antiseptics. 


HORTICULTURE



DRAMA

This standard saw things like mental health, relationships, life and death as well as the exploration of special cultural stories presented.

Finally, we journeyed up to Palmerston North to see a live piece of theatre to write about for the external exam. It was awesome to see the students responding to and appreciating the incredible performance we saw.

I was very impressed with their questions during the Q & A session and as always, it was interesting to hear everyone's interpretations in our class debrief session.

The Senior Drama students demonstrated resilience, dedication and above all, support for each other. I am extremely proud of my students and their flexibility, passion and compassion for each other and wish them all the best for the future, especially my Level 3 students who are off to continue studying

A small group of Year 9 students joined with the Waiopehu Choir to perform at this year's Big Sing. For Lavara, Eden and Leo this was a wonderful experience.





DESIGN & VISUAL COMMUNICATION



Physical Education



We also had some teachers from other areas join our department and they did a great job fitting into the chaotic gym space. Thank you to Mr James Gilroy and Miss Courtenay Davis for being adaptable and supporting our junior ākonga. Finally a massive thank you to Mr Rob Cox who came out of retirement to take on Miss Davidson's maternity leave position.

Ms Andi Hirini continues to support all our ākonga in their sporting endeavours and she has done a fantastic job. Without her, we would be unable to successfully run all of the house events such as swimming, athletics, and tug of war.

This year was the second year of our junior PE programme's rotation. The Year 9s and 10s do the same units across a 2-year cycle. This saw the students gain confidence in our water safety unit, run across the Tararuas in our Maunga Haerenga unit, gain knowledge in risk management through parkour, and apply strategies to improve their badminton skills.

Finally, the students will take on the softball unit in Term 4 to learn striking defensive and offensive strategies and skills. Junior Health continues to look at drug-related issues, mental health, positive relationships, grief, change, and nutrition. These units provide students with the knowledge and





skills to keep themselves safe and supported.

Outdoor Education

Outdoor Education proved to be a popular subject option this year through Years 9 to 13. Students in the junior programmes have enjoyed participating in a range of outdoor pursuits including kayaking in our school pool, cycling in the local area, rock climbing on our school wall and completing orienteering courses, and developing their bush craft skills. In addition to this, the Year 10 students culminated their first semester by going on a day trip into the bush and completing a loop offtrack. The students in the second semester put their navigation and aquatic skills to the test in a series of challenges at Waitārere Beach. The senior programmes connect students to the local environment through outdoor pursuits such as kayaking, rock climbing, tramping, camping, and mountain biking. Through local off-site day trips, the students developed their interpersonal skills, emotional intelligence and understanding of mātauranga Māori. One of the highlights for the Year 11 students was participating in an overnight tramping trip. One class hiked to the top of Mt Kapakapanui to enjoy the spectacular views, while the other class headed into the bush from Poad's Road to challenge their off-track navigation skills. The Year 12 and 13 class also completed a three day bush trip where they explored the Ōtaki Forks area and slept in shelters they constructed themselves. Next year is looking promising as we continue





to adapt the courses and plan exciting outdoor adventures for our students. **Health**

Senior Health continues to grow in numbers. This is the first year we have had 2 Level 1 classes since Health was introduced. This has seen numbers continue into other levels. Whaea Steph has been doing an excellent job supporting the Level 2 students when learning about promoting positive sexuality, analysing resilience and looking at social media and how it can cause harm to adolescents. Level 3s focused on vaccination as it is a very current issue, they looked at different ways to treat health conditions and finally analysed different health promotion models. The junior Health Plus classes have been looking at mental health, hauora, resilience and mindfulness units. This course continues to be dynamic and ever-changing

High Performance

High-performance students have worked diligently throughout the year working towards tasks to create their own sport-specific websites using Google sites. Their websites are targeted at a level for new athletes that are interested in giving their sport a go. The students were given opportunities to create their own warm-ups and work out plans and they then coached the class through these confidently. Each term the students have challenged themselves through a variety of different fitness tests. The tests included the BRONCO, beep test, and the HPSP test which have been documented on their website along with a nutrition plan and a mini improvement training plan. We were lucky enough to have guests throughout the year which included Drug Free Sport NZ and Foot Steps which gave





the students an opportunity to gain new skills and knowledge.

Senior PE and Sport Science

This year Sports Science 3 students were exposed to some coaching unit standards focused on the rights and responsibilities of a coach, planning and delivering a coaching programme, and injury prevention. The class went to St Joseph's across the road to deliver some of the coaching plans they managed. The students that stood out in coaching were Gabe Welsh, Brenna Greene, Ali Parata and Harry Chambers. The Level 2 Sports Science class focussed on event management, being socially responsible, and analysing risk management. Level 3 PE analysed the tennis serve, trained to improve their rock climbing skills, and looked at what it takes to have a lifelong positive relationship with physical activity. Finally, the Level 2 PE class focussed on improving their badminton skills for their training programme, leadership strategies, and the biomechanics and anatomy behind a volleyball serve.

This year has been full of exciting trips, events, and experiences for our ākonga. We had our first fun badminton competition this year and Nathan Eyles and Mayank Thakur were our student champs. We also have competitions for house points including the book bingo, where we are challenged to read 25 books or more, write reviews, and earn house points.



Rugby




